Archbishop's Message



o we stop to recollect and realise that the origin of our present eschatological existence in this world as God's one holy Catholic Church in the Holy Spirit and God's promised 'kingdom of heaven' on earth, was the decision of God's only begotten Son to become God's promised servant in His human nature (Is.42:1f), by receiving John's 'baptism of repentance' in order to take upon Himself 'the sins of the many, 'atone for them' once for all on the Cross 'like a lamb led to the slaughter house' and is 'dumb before its shearers (Is.53:7,10a), and be raised from the dead and exalted at the Eternal Father's 'right hand'as the Lamb of God that takes away the sins of the world' (Jn.1:29, Rev.5:6-10,12)' and give definitive birth to this promised kingdom and Church on Pentecost day as promised by God to His Remnant in Babylon: 'I shall gather the Israelites together from everywhere and bring them to their own soil... and make them one nation...save them from the acts of infidelity they have committed and cleanse them; they shall be My people and I shall be their God. My servant David shall reign over them, one shepherd for all; they shall follow My judgements, respect My laws and follow them...I shall make a covenant of peace with them, an eternal covenant with them...I shall set My sanctuary among them forever... And the nations shall know that I am the Lord, the sanctifier of Israel when My sanctuary is with them forever (Ezekiel 37:20-28).

This is the kingdom that the Son our Lord Jesus Christ proclaimed in the length and breadth of the promised land saying 'the kingdom of God is at hand. Repent and believe in the gospel.' Was it not into this promised kingdom that we received 'birth from above' and which we entered by being sacramentally 'born of water and the Spirit'? Are we this synodal people of this kingdom of heaven who constitute the Church which the Son Jesus Christ our Lord builds on the rock of Peter, on the one hand because they have been called by God the Father to belong to this kingdom through the birth 'from above' which He gives them (In. 3:3), and on the other hand because He leads them to worship God the Father 'in spirit and truth' in union with Himself in His sacramental liturgical sacrifice of the Cross on the altars of His kingdom and Church as their life-giving Head, in order to unite them to God His Father forever in the glory of His resurrection on 'the last day'? And as ministers ordained into His one priesthood and as consecrated religious and as the synodal people of God, are we giving Him the required service to enable Him to carry out this awesome and unspeakably burdensome task successfully, for the greater glory of His Eternal Father and for our salvation and that of all mankind for whom He laid down His life once for all on the Cross? Surely, our task as the synodal people of God during the current ordinary Sundays preceding Ash Wednesday, is discover truthful answers to these questions in our personal, community and ecclesial lives for our conversion unto God, sanctification and salvation and everlasting happiness.

FEBRUARY 2nd

The Presentation of The Lord (Feast)

This feast commemorates how Jesus, as a baby, was presented to God in the Temple in Jerusalem. This presentation finds its complete and perfect fulfilment in the mystery of the passion, death and Resurrection of the Lord. The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is a combined feast, commemorating the Jewish practice of the purification of the mother after childbirth and the presentation of the child to God in the Temple and his buying back (redemption) from God



It is also known as the Feast of the Purification of Mary, and the Feast of Candlemas. It is also called the Feast of Encounter (Hypapánte in Greek) because the New Testament, represented by the baby Jesus, encountered the Old Testament, represented by Simeon and Anna. Joseph offered two pigeons in the Temple as sacrifice for the purification of Mary after her childbirth and for the presentation and redemption ceremonies performed for baby Jesus. *Source: www.catholic.org*

FEBRUARY 14th

ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday is one of the most popular and important holy days in the liturgical calendar. Ash Wednesday opens Lent, a season of fasting and prayer.

Ash Wednesday takes place 46 days before Easter Sunday, and is chiefly observed by Catholics, although many other Christians observe it too.

Ash Wednesday comes from the ancient Jewish tradition of penance and fasting. The practice includes the wearing of ashes on the head. The ashes symbolize the



dust from which God made us. As the priest applies the ashes to a person's forehead, he speaks the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Alternatively, the priest may speak the words, "Repent and believe in the Gospel."

Ashes also symbolize grief, in this case, grief that we have sinned and caused division from God.Writings from the Second-century Church refer to the wearing of ashes as a sign of penance. Priests administer ashes during Mass and all are invited to accept the ashes as a visible symbol of penance. Even non-Christians and the excommunicated are welcome to receive the ashes. The ashes are made from blessed palm branches, taken from the previous year's palm Sunday Mass.It is important to remember that Ash Wednesday is a day of penitential prayer and fasting. Some faithful take the rest of the day off work and remain

home. It is generally inappropriate to dine out, to shop, or to go about in public after receiving the ashes. Feasting is highly inappropriate. Small children, the elderly and sick are exempt from this observance. It is not required that a person wear the ashes for the rest of the day, and they may be washed off after Mass. However, many people keep the ashes as a reminder until the evening.

Recently, movements have developed that involve pastors distributing ashes to passersby in public places. This isn't considered taboo, but Catholics should know this practice is distinctly Protestant Catholics should still receive ashes within the context of Mass.In some cases, ashes may be delivered by a priest or a family member to those who are sick or shut-in.Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Season of Lent It is a season of penance, reflection, and fasting which prepares us for Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday, through which we attain redemption.

FEBRUARY 22ND

Chair of St. Peter (Feast)

The Feast of the Chair of St. Peter the apostle reminds us of what the Lord said to Peter, "You are Peter and upon this rock I will build my Church" Matthew 16:18, and "Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" Matthew 16:19. St. Peter's life is so important to the Church that he has more than one feast day during the year. Today's feast is another way the Church celebrates this. The chair of St. Peter is a symbol of authority, as Jesus refers to this in Matthew 23: 2, when he commands and warns the crowd and his disciples, "The Scribes and Pharisees have taken their



seat on the chair of Moses". The "chair" is metaphorically referring to the teaching and judging office that Moses held in the Name of God. The name that Jesus gives to Peter is a second metaphor for an office of teaching and judging, and to drive the point home, Jesus uses a third metaphor by speaking of the "Keys of the kingdom of Heaven" Mathew 16:19. The "power of the keys" is used in many ways; some are specific to the Office of St. Peter the Papacy, others are shared with those ordained to priestly ministry, the Sacrament of Confession. his feast day is an anniversary and celebration of the "authority" of the Papacy, and the particular mission entrusted to St. Peter by Iesus. The Roman Missal explains, the symbol of the chair, and emphasizes the mission of teacher and pastor of Christ conferred upon Peter, to whom He formed in His person and in St. Peter's successors, a visible foundation of unity of the Church. The chair, literally is a fixed seat of the supreme Pontiff and the Bishops, permanently placed in the Mother Church of the Diocese - Cathedral, and is the symbol of the Bishop and his ordinary magisterium in the local church. The Chair of St. Peter indicates his position in the Apostolic College, established by the express will of Jesus, who assigned the task of "feeding" the flock, to lead the People of God, the Church. 1. RECOLLECTION IN FEBRUARY - 2024

All the Deans are here-by requested to conduct the Recollection at Deanery level for the month of February, 2024. All the Clergy are requested to attend the "Deanery Level Recollection" and if anyone is unable to attend the recollection, please inform the respective Deans. 2. THE WORLD DAY OF THE SICK 2024:

The world day of the sick is celebrated on 11th February 2024. As per the direction and instructions given by the Holy Father Pope Francis, we need to observe the World Day of the Sick on 11th February, 2024 (The Feast Day of our Lady of Lourdes). World Day of the Sick is a Catholic Church awareness day, or observance, on February 11, aimed at praying for the sick. All are invited to pray for the sick and provide medicine, food and counseling to the needy. Pope Francis invites everyone to see the face of Christ in his or her ailing brother or sister.

The theme given by the Holy Father for the World Day of the Sick 2024 is Healing Love: Witnessing to Compassion and Service.

3. **SEASON OF LENT 2024**:

I. **ASH WEDNESDAY**: This year, Ash Wednesday falls on 14th February, 2024, on which the holy Lenten period begins. All the Parish Priests are requested to make sure that the way of the cross is conducted in all our Parish Churches/Chapels/Mass Centres on every Wednesdays and Fridays during the Lenten season. All the Heads of the Institutions are requested to make sure that our Catholic children/youth participate in the "Way of the Cross "service in Parish Churches/Chapels/Mass Centres on Wednesdays and Fridays. It is the great responsibility of

all of us to promote solid and strong Catholic Faith Formation to all our Catholic children/ adults in our Parishes and in our Institutions, which is to be lived, celebrated and shared with others.

- II. **LAW OF ABSTINENCE** (KEEPING AWAY FROM MEAT): The Catholics who have completed 14 years of age are to observe the law of abstinence on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of the year.
- III. **LAW OF FASTING**: The law of fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, by all those who have completed 18 years of age and have not yet begun the 60^{th} year of their age.

4. MONTHLY RECOLLECTION AND CHRISM MASS IN MARCH:

- **4.1** Archdiocesan Monthly Clergy Recollection will be held at Archbishop's House, on 21st March, 2024, Thursday, from 09.30 am to 01.00 pm. All the Archdiocesan and Pastoral Clergy are to participate in this recollection for the good and immediate preparation for the Holy Week and Easter.
- **4.2** Chrism Mass will be held on 21st March, 2024 at 05:30 pm in St Mary's Basilica, Secunderabad. The Clergy, Religious and the Faithful are invited to participate in the Liturgy of the Eucharist.





2. THE WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY-2024, ORGANIZED BY THE ARCHDIOCESAN COMMISSION FOR ECUMENISM

The Annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was observed from the 18th to 25th January 2024 with the proposed theme for reflection: "You shall love the Lord your God ... and your neighbour as yourself." (Luke 10:27). Under the direction of Fr. Anthaiah Kondaveeti, Regional Secretary, TCBC Commission for Ecumenism,



could reach out to different Church Councils, Church Federations, and Church organizations like the Telangana Council of Churches - TCC, Telangana State Federation of Churches - TSFC, United Christmas Celebrations Committee – UCCC, Twin-Cities Pastors Fellowship, and several other Christian denominations to celebrate the unity octave in various churches in the Archdiocese.

Along with Fr. K. Anthaiah, Fr. There were eminent Pastors,



Priests, and Church Leaders who shared their reflections each day on the need for Christian unity as desired by Jesus our Lord.

If you already have a plan, consider modifying and updating it or share your valuable experiences for the benefit of the nation. This one-day workshop is not just about strategic planning for CCBI; it's about setting the course for our regions and dioceses. Through collective energy and ownership, we aim to be more result-oriented, gathering the fruits of our pastoral engagements.

May this day be filled with inspiration, divine guidance, and a shared commitment to the vision of CCBI. Let us actively contribute to the moulding of our Commissions and the realization of God's plan for the Church in India by 2033. Thank you, and may God's grace be with us throughout this sacred journey.

Regional News

1. THE JUBILEE YEAR - 2025

Pope Francis has announced that the Church will celebrate a Jubilee Year in 2025, with the theme of "Pilgrims of Hope". Pope Francis urges Catholics to prepare for the Jubilee by spending time in studying the four Constitutions of the Second Vatican Council and focusing on prayer. The most recent ordinary jubilee took place in the year 2000, as the world and the Catholic Church prepared to enter the new millennium.

The Jubilee Year is a special year of grace, in which the Church offers the faithful the possibility of obtaining a plenary indulgence. Traditionally, it begins just before Christmas and ends on the Epiphany of the following year. The Pope inaugurates the Holy Year with the rite of the opening of the Holy Door in St. Peter's Basilica. After that, the Holy Doors of the other papal basilicas – St John Lateran, St Paul Outside the Walls, and St. Mary Major – are opened and remain so until the end of the Jubilee Year.

Preparation and Celebration for Jubilee 2025

Introduction

Our Holy Mother Church has completed the First Session of the XVI General Assembly of the Synod on synodality, reflecting on 'communion, mission, participation.' The journey began in October 2021 with the Diocesan Phase, when all the faithful of the Local Churches were involved in the process of sharing, listening and discerning in the light of the 10 thematic nuclei; in the Continental Phase, we discerned on different voices that emerged across the Episcopal Conferences; and in the Universal Phase, discernment has been made on communion, mission, and participation, and the synthesis report, 'A Synodal Church in Mission' is its fruit.

Jubilee in the Bible

Etymologically, the word 'jubilee' comes from the Hebrew word 'yobel' (ram's horn) which was used as a trumpet to announce the beginning of the 50th year, i.e.,

the completion of 49 years (7 times 7 years). According to Lev 25:8-13 the celebration of the jubilee year entails release of slaves, forgiveness of debts, repatriation of property. In other words, jubilee is understood as four **R**'s: **Rest** (the land is given rest); **Review** (an inventory of life, livestock, personnel, and land is taken); **Restore** (setting the societal clock back to zero); and **Reconcile** (aligning our relationships right with God and one another). The 'holy year' which the Prophet Isaiah (cf. Isa 61: 1ff; see also Lk 4: 16ff) speaks of also alludes to jubilee. Here, the holy year is understood as the year of recalling and announcing God's favour and mercy. From the biblical point of view, celebration of a jubilee makes us retrospect the **past** (liberation), live in the **present** (consolation), and set our vision on the **future** (moving forward). Besides, jubilee is the celebration of time, and since it is the celebration of time it is a gift from God. That is why we pray at the Easter Vigil: 'all times belong to him and all ages.'

Jubilees in History

The first ordinary jubilee year ('holy year') was announced in 1300 by Pope Boniface VIII. Initially, ordinary jubilee was celebrated once in 100 years; Pope Clement VI in 1343 began to celebrate it every 50 years; in 1470 Pope Paul II made it every 25 years. There have also been 'extraordinary' holy years: in 1933 Pope Pius XI celebrated 1900th anniversary of the Redemption; in 2015 Pope Francis proclaimed the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy. The previous ordinary jubilee was the Great Jubilee 2000, for which we had three years of preparation: 1997 (with focus on God the Son), 1998 (with focus on God the Holy Spirit), and 1999 (with focus on God the Father). Jubilee events entail entering the holy door, undertaking pilgrimages, obtaining indulgences, etc.

Characteristics of the Jubilee

The Dicastery for Evangelization, Section for Fundamental Questions regarding Evangelization in the World, which coordinates the celebrations, spells out seven characteristics of the Jubilee: (i) Pilgrimage (journey, crossing of boundaries, going across the fields, with other journeying companions); (ii) Holy Door (powerful sign, four Roman Basilicas, Jesus is the Door, journey to the interior of a church); (iii) Reconciliation (placing God at the centre of our lives, restoration of social justice, confession); (iv) Prayer (being open to God's presence and his offer of love); (v) Liturgy (public prayer of the Church, summit and font, opening of the door); (vi) Profession of faith (identity of the baptized person, Apostolic Creed, Nicene Creed); and (vii) Indulgences (experience of God's mercy, offering up sufferings).

The threefold purpose of the Jubilee

- ➤ **To celebrate Jesus,** the incarnate Son of the Father through the power of the Holy Spirit We commemorate his birth, life, teaching, ministry, passion, death, and resurrection. We take conscious and fruitful efforts 'to know him more clearly, to love him more dearly, and to follow him more nearly.'
- ➤ To celebrate the Church, which is our Mother and Teacher. We renew our commitment to our Holy Catholic Church by owing our communion and contribution.'
- ➤ To celebrate each one of us, with unique gifts and charisms, vocations and ministries, lifestyles, and values.

Preparation and Celebration for Jubilee 2025

'Pilgrims of Hope' is the motto of the celebrations of Ordinary Jubilee 2025. Our Holy Father Pope Francis underscores the importance of hope in Christian life amidst uncertainties and hardships created by the pandemic and wars. **Learn**, **Pray**, and Walk - these are the three words that we need to remember as we journey together. In the preparatory year (2023-2024), we shall promote the study of the Four Constitutions of the Second Vatican Council: Sacrosanctum Concilium, Dei Verbum, Lumen Gentium and Gaudium et Spes in order to understand the general themes of the Council, and to explore Jesus, the Church, and our lives in the world today. The Dicastery of Evangelization has brought forth 35 booklets giving background information to the Second Vatican Council and to the Four Constitutions. In the year of prayer (2024), we are called to pray with the Universal Church, in the Local Churches, for the entire humanity. We shall reflect on prayer in Christian life, sacraments, sacramentals, pious practices, and popular devotions as well. The Dicastery has published 9 notebooks on prayer. In the year of Jubilee celebration (2025), we will be invited to walk the Jubilee Doors in Rome making a pilgrimage to the Four Basilicas as well to undertake similar pursuit in our Archdiocese of Hyderabad as per the guidance given by our Archbishop. We are also invited to enter the doors for hope, lighting a ray of hope in prisons, homes for the elderly, the dying and the destitute, the hospitals, the migrants, the marginalised, etc. The Ordinary Jubilee 2025, an integral part of the synodal *journey*, invites us to be pilgrims of hope, givers of hope, and livers of hope.

Theme and Logo

The logo for the Jubilee 2025 shows four figures in four colours representing the entire humanity hailing from the four corners of the earth. They embrace each other in solidarity and fraternity. The figure at the front holds fast to the cross, which gives us hope. The rough waves under the figures represent the present context of the world which is marked by turmoil and troubles. The lower part



of the cross has been elongated and turned into the shape of an anchor which is a symbol of hope. The image illustrates the pilgrim's journey not as an individual effort, but as a collective enterprise. At the bottom of the logo lies the motto of the Jubilee Year 2025: '*Peregrinantes in Spem*' ('Pilgrims of Hope'). The Jubilee 2025 is meant to celebrate God, the Church, and each of us. The post-pandemic war-hitting world today needs 'hope.' As pilgrims of hope let us light candle of hope in our families, workplaces, parishes, deaneries, Archdiocese, and society.

Inauguration of the Preparation in the Archdiocese:

Integrating the synodal journey, and responding to the invitation of the Holy Father, the Church in India, inaugurated the preparations for the Ordinary Jubilee 2025. The CCBI in its circular dated 26th September, requested to inaugurate the Preparations for the Ordinary Jubilee 2025 in each of the Dioceses on Sunday, 26th November 2023, the Solemnity of Christ the King. In the Archdiocese of Hyderabad, the preparations for the Jubilee Year 2025 were inaugurated by His Eminence Cardinal Poola Anthony on November 26, 2023, on the occasion of solemn feast of Christ the Universal King, at St. Joseph's Cathedral, Gunfoundryat 8.30 a.m. Mass.In some of the parishes and parish units in the Archdiocese of Hyderabad, the preparations for the Jubilee Year 2025 were inaugurated on December 3, 2023, the first Sunday of Advent. The logo to be unveiled was sent to you in the form of a scroll, which has to be hung in a prominent place and unveiled after the homily. Jubilee prayer cards were also sent to your parishes. This prayer is to be recited every day, at every Mass after the Post-Communion Prayer. The Archdiocese of Hyderabad also printed special stickers with Jubilee logo which can be pasted on the doors of our catholic parishioners' houses and to the vehicles etc. the stickers are available at Archbishop's House office and each sticker costs only Rs.1/- (Rupees one only). Kindly collect and distribute in your parishes.

Hence, let us take this opportunity to learn, pray and journey together and celebrate God, celebrate the Church as the People of God, and let us celebrate each one of us on this synodal journey. May this period of preparation for the Jubilee be an occasion for our spiritual enrichment.

1. POPE TO PRIESTS OF ROME: WE ARE IN A MISSIONARY LAND

Pope Francis meets with over 800 priests of the Diocese of Rome in the Basilica of St. John Lateran, and calls the clergy to bear credible witness to Christ and to keep their homilies brief and direct.

A "missionary land". This was how Pope Francis described the Diocese of Rome on Saturday morning.

He met in the city's Cathedral Basilica of St. John Lateran for his annual encounter with the clergy of Rome.

The Pope arrived shortly after 9 AM, and was welcomed by Cardinal Angelo De Donatis, the Diocesan Vicar.

To the over 800 priests, diocesans, religious, and permanent deacons serving the Diocese, the Bishop of Rome launched an appeal for the evangelization of the entire ecclesiastical community.

The Pope also announced that he will resume visiting the parishes of the diocese, after the pause imposed by the pandemic.

Open, friendly dialogue

The meeting, which lasted about three hours, was reported in a statement from the Diocese of Rome to have taken place "with an open and familiar dialogue in cordial atmosphere."

Following Midmorning Prayer, Cardinal De Donatis greeted the Pope, who then opened up the floor for questions.

He invited them to ask questions freely and sincerely, fielding about thirty questions.

Pope Francis spoke about the necessity of evangelization in a pagan context, emphasizing the importance of bearing credible witness.

Blessing people, not sin

He then responded to questions about blessing homosexual couples, stating that the doctrine on the Sacrament of Marriage between a man and a woman has not changed, saying that people are blessed, not sin.

To a question from an African-born priest, he said that African culture does not accept these blessings because there are different sensitivities. He added that this has been clarified with Cardinal Fridolin Ambongo, Archbishop of Kinshasa and President of SECAM (Symposium of the Episcopal Conferences of Africa and Madagascar).

Pope Francis stated that many do not read well the texts of the Church. Good listening is required, he emphasized, noting that conflicts must be managed but not hidden.

The Pope then urged the priests of Rome to always forgive. "I always forgive; one must always have mercy," he said.

On the topic of permanent deacons, he said they must be among the people, serving those in need.

In conclusion, Pope Francis recalled that homilies should be brief, about 7/8 minutes, direct, and must capture the spirit of the Word of God.

2. POPE'S WORLD DAY OF SICK MESSAGE: HEAL RELATIONSHIPS TO HEAL THE ILL

Pope Francis releases his message for the 32nd World Day of the Sick, and calls for a 'therapeutic covenant' between people who are ill and their caregivers, family members, and God.

"It is not good that man should be alone—Healing the Sick by Healing Relationships," is the theme of Pope Francis' message for the 2024 commemoration of the World Day of the Sick, held on 11 February.

In his message, released on Saturday, the Pope explores the fundamental importance and healing power of our relationships with others and with God.

Drawing on God's words about Adam in the Biblical Book of Genesis, he notes that God's first thought for the first man was that he should be in communion and relationship with other beings.

"Our lives, reflecting in the image of the Trinity, are meant to attain fulfilment through a network of relationships, friendships and love, both given and received," says the Pope. "We were created to be together, not alone."

This relational aspect of humanity, he adds, retains its importance even in moments of vulnerability, illness, and insecurity, which are often caused by the onset of a serious illness.

Therapeutic covenant

Pope Francis points out that the Covid-19 pandemic and ongoing wars have isolated many people.

Yet, he says, even countries living in peace and enjoying greater resources have a large number of people who face solitude and even abandonment due to old age and sickness.

Our "throwaway cultures" exalt productivity and individualism at the cost of those unable to produce an economic gain.

Politicians, says the Pope, are thus tempted to water down the "fundamental right to health and access to healthcare" by turning healthcare into a mere "provision of services" and wounding the dignity of the human person.

The Holy Father calls for healthcare systems to be accompanied "by a 'therapeutic covenant' between physicians, patients, and family members."

God's project of communion for humanity

Returning to God's words—"It is not good for man to be alone"—Pope Francis says human sin wounds a person by severing their relationships "with God, with themselves, with others, with creation" and going against the "profound meaning of God's project for humanity."

"Such isolation causes us to miss the meaning of our lives," he says. "It takes away the joy of love and makes us experience an oppressive sense of being alone at all the crucial passages of life."

The Pope therefore invites everyone to offer compassionate and loving closeness to those who are ill, following the example of the Good Samaritan (Lk 10:25-37). "To care for the sick thus means above all to care for their relationships, all of them: with God, with others—family members, friends, healthcare workers—with creation and with themselves."

Healing wounds of solitude and isolation

Each of us, says the Pope, came into the world because our parents welcomed us, and we were each "made for love" and are called to communion and fraternity.

The best therapy for those who are ill, he adds, is to offer them our love and communion, despite the pace of our own frenetic lives.

"To those of you who experience illness, whether temporary or chronic, I would say this: Do not be ashamed of your longing for closeness and tenderness!" says the Pope. "Do not conceal it, and never think that you are a burden on others."

In conclusion, the Holy Father invites Christians to draw inspiration from Jesus' compassion-filled gaze through prayer and the Eucharist, so as to "heal the wounds of solitude and isolation." "The sick, the vulnerable, and the poor are at the heart of the Church," concludes Pope Francis. "They must also be at the heart of our human concern and pastoral attention."


