A happy and blessed New Year to one and all of you in Christ Jesus our Lord!

other Earth began her yearly voyage in space around the Sun just after the winter solstice of 23rd of December 2023 and has presently completed it on the winter solstice of 23rd December 2024 on the Tropic of Capricorn (at the latitude of twenty three and a half degrees south of the equator). Now it has begun that same yearly voyage around the Sun which it will complete once again, through the benign Providence of her Creator, on the winter solstice of 23rd December 2025. As Mother Earth makes her yearly voyage around the Sun, she presents her face full of living beings once every 24 hours to the Sun to fulfil the yearning of these living beings to receive the necessary heat and light from the Sun to continue as living beings on earth. And we too, with our biological human bodies, experienced and partook of this global yearning! 'Very natural' you may say, but very wonderful indeed! if only you stop for a moment to reflect on the profundity of the ramifications of this 'yearly' experience, and discover that 'the year' is the time period for all living beings, and particularly for us human beings, to yearn for and experience the fulfilment of their existential needs and how faithfully they are fulfilled by their Creator through the unfailing service given to Him by the Sun He has established for this purpose.

Solemnities and Feasts

JANUARY 01

Mary the Mother of God (Solemnity)



The Solemnity of Mary, Holy Mother of God is a liturgical celebration observed on January 1st which falls exactly one week after Christmas, the end of the octave of Christmas.

The Blessed Virgin Mary is honored as the Mother of God because she conceived and gave birth to Christ, who is the incarnation of God the Son, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. It is fitting to honor Mary as Mother of Jesus, following the birth of Christ. When Catholics celebrate the Solemnity of Mary Mother of God, we are not only honoring

Mary, who was chosen among all women throughout history to bear God incarnate, but we are also honoring our Lord, who is fully God and fully human. Since the first centuries of Christianity, the Church customarily has regarded the Blessed Virgin Mary to be the Mother of God for a simple, logical reason; By the power of the Holy Spirit, she conceived Jesus Christ, the Son of God. Since the divine Person, God the Son, assumed, or took on, human nature, she is the Mother of God in the fullest since: "What the Catholic faith believes about Mary is based on what it believes about Christ, and what it teaches about Mary illumines in turn its faith in Christ" (CCC 487). The Church solemnly defined this belief at the Ecumenical Council of Ephesus AD 431.

JANUARY 05

The Epiphany of The Lord (Feast)

At the time of Jesus' birth, it was commonly believed that a new star would appear whenever a new ruler was born. The Father in Heaven used this belief to honor His Son Who was born as the new King. The three Magi from the East were astrologers. When they saw this "new star," they chose to follow it to discover the new King. Creation itself, in the form of a star, pointed the way, thus giving glory to the newborn King, manifesting Him to the whole world




as symbolized by the Magi. The word "Epiphany" means "manifestation." Therefore, as we honor this moment in time when the Christ Child was made manifest to the world, we need to look into our own hearts. There, we discover Christ's ongoing manifestation to us so that we can worship Him Who has also chosen to be born within our hearts. We must diligently seek out that manifestation of God within us and respond to it in the same ways that the Magi responded.

The Magi brought the Christ Child gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. God was honored and glorified through His creation by the giving of these gifts. God created gold to manifest His beauty and dignity. It was a gift that symbolized kingship. When we ponder

the natural gift of gold given to the Christ Child, we are inspired to give Him our own gift of symbolic gold by prayerfully acknowledging Him as our own King to whom we pledge our complete submission. Made from the sap of trees found in India, northeastern Africa, and the Arabian peninsula, frankincense and myrrh are also fruits of God's creation. Used in worship to symbolize prayers rising to heaven, frankincense symbolizes the Christ Child's divinity. We offer frankincense to Christ when we acknowledge His divine nature, since He is God in the flesh. Often used in burial, myrrh honors the Christ Child Who came to give His life as a sacrifice for many. We offer myrrh to profess our belief in the saving power of Christ's death on the Cross and our need for that gift of salvation.

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is a liturgical bridge that connects the Christmas season to Ordinary Time. During the Christmas season we pondered the Incarnation, Nativity, Presentation in the Temple, and Epiphany. Today, we see Jesus manifesting Himself to the world as He began His three years of public ministry. Jesus begins His ministry through an act of deep solidarity with the fallen human race. John the Baptist had been preaching in the desert and offering a baptism of repentance. John's

baptism was not the same as our baptism today. Instead, it was only a sign of one's willingness to turn away from sin and turn toward God. Jesus, of course, had nothing to repent of. He was sinless in every way. But that didn't stop Him from freely choosing to receive the baptism of repentance. Why would He do that?

Simply put, Jesus chose to unite Himself with fallen humanity, taking upon Himself our own sins and suffering their consequences. He humbly allowed Himself to be identified as a sinner in need of repentance. This was done out of love for us and out of His longing to become one with us so that we could become one with Him. By bowing His sacred head to receive the baptism of repentance, Jesus united Himself and His divinity to everyone who had already chosen to repent. And He gave power to every forthcoming act of repentance others would make, even until today. When we repent today, we meet Jesus in that same water of repentance. It was not only the Eternal Son Who was present at that baptism of repentance, but the Father and the Holy Spirit as well. The Spirit descended upon Jesus in the form of a dove, and the Father's Voice spoke to acknowledge His oneness with His Son. Therefore, every time we make a humble act of repentance, such as when we combine the crucifixion, the Trinity, and holy water upon entering a church and blessing ourselves, we not only meet our Lord but also receive the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and share more fully in our adoption as sons and daughters of the Father in Heaven.

The Conversion of St. Paul (Feast)

Saint Paul's entire life can be explained in terms of one experience—his meeting with Jesus on the road to Damascus. In an instant, he saw that all the zeal of his dynamic personality was being wasted, like the strength of a boxer swinging wildly. Perhaps he had never seen Jesus, who was only a few years older. But he had acquired a zealot's hatred of all Jesus stood for, as he began to harass the Church: "...entering house after house and dragging out men and women.

he handed them over for imprisonment" (Acts 8:3b). Now he himself was "entered," possessed, all his energy harnessed to one goal—being a slave of Christ in the ministry of reconciliation, an instrument to help others experience the one Savior. One sentence determined his theology: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9:5b). Jesus was mysteriously identified with people—the loving group of people Saul had been running down like criminals. Jesus, he saw, was the mysterious fulfilment of all he had been blindly pursuing. From then on, his only work was to "present everyone perfect in Christ For this I labor and struggle, in accord with the exercise of his power working within me" (Colossians 1:28b-29). "For our gospel did not come to you in word alone, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and [with] much conviction" (1 Thessalonians 1:5a). Paul's life became a tireless proclaiming and living out of the message of the cross: Christians die baptismally to sin and are buried with Christ; they are dead to all that is sinful and unredeemed in the world.

- Receive the Sacraments of Penance and Holy Communion.
- Pray for the intentions of the Holy Father.

The Church, drawing on the merits of Christ, the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Saints, offers this grace to inspire spiritual renewal. Priests are urged to facilitate access to the Sacraments, plan penitential celebrations and guide the faithful in embracing the Jubilee's spirit of mercy and forgiveness.

As we prepare for this Blessed Year, the Jubilee reminds us of our mission to walk together as a Church, promoting justice, peace and love. This Christmas season and in the New Year, we are called to reflect on how we live as a community of faith, listening to God's call and responding to the needs of the world. The Jubilee is an invitation to transformation, uniting the Church in hope and faith and encouraging all to be agents of God's mercy and renewal.

3. JUBILEE YEAR 2025 ANNOUNCEMENT:

In celebration of the Jubilee Year 2025, as per the call of His Holiness Pope Francis, we grant special privileges to five designated churches within the Archdiocese of Hyderabad. The Archdiocese invites all faithful to participate actively in this Jubilee Year by visiting these churches, engaging in prayerful reflection and deepening their faith. All the Parish Priests are asked to organize Pilgrimages, Special events, Rretreats and Seminars throughout the year to enhance the spiritual experience of the Jubilee.

We encourage every member of the faithful to take this opportunity to renew their spiritual lives and seek the abundant Grace available during this Holy Year.

Let us journey together in faith, hope and love as we celebrate the Jubilee Year 2025.

In his Apostolic Letter Aperuitillis issued September 30, 2019, Pope Francis instituted the celebration of Sunday of the Word of God. In 2025, it will be celebrated on the **26**th **January**, **2025**. 1. STATEMENT OF THE GBM OF THE CATHOLIC OF INDIA (CCI) (15th – 17th November 2024)



To the Church of India, The CBCI and the World

The Catholic Council of India (CCI), is the National Pastoral Council of India under CBCI (Catholic Bishops' Conference of India) which has 174 dioceses in 14 regions belonging to the 3 sui juris churches – Latin, Syro-Malabar and Syro-Malankara. The CCI, as the Indian Church in Council, met from 15th to 17th November 2024 at the Alphonsian Pastoral Institute, Pala, Kerala for the 15th GBM. 175 members representing Catholic Bishops, Priests, Religious, Laity, National Institutions and Offices attended the GBM.

The Theme for the GBM was 'The Vital Role of the Laity in the Socio-Political Context of India'. In light of the Synod on Synodality, the CCI reaffirmed the critical role of the laity in shaping the mission of the Church. The GBM reflected on the role of the laity which is key for a synodal missionary church as exhorted by Pope Francis.

The members declared that we will journey together with all people of goodwill, sharing in each other's joys and sorrows. We want to ensure that our families, communities and institutions continue to imbibe and promote the values of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the Indian Constitution. We will also focus on continuous formation of the laity.

We, as baptised Christians, are aware of our duties mandated to us by Jesus Christ to be missionaries in the modern world, witnessing to the Gospel under the guidance and in collaboration with the hierarchy, listening, sharing and discerning under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Key Commitments and Resolutions:

1. Promoting Constitutional Values

We are proud that we have been at the forefront in our Nation building, especially in the areas of education, health care and social uplift and we commit ourselves to continue this. We are aware that we have to protect human rights, constitutional rights and the rights of women, children and the marginalized.

2. Encouraging Active Participation of the Faithful

- a. The faithful are encouraged to engage actively in the governance of the state.
- b. Members of the CCI are urged to address social, economic and political issues in their neighbourhoods.
- c. The laity should be organized at various levels including youth and other stakeholders, ensuring that the Church's strength is built on their active involvement.

3. Strengthening Media and Legal Support

A strong media presence and the establishment of a legal cell are essential for addressing challenges and providing legal advice to the community.

1. Cycle of Catechesis. The Spirit and the Bride. The Holy Spirit guides the people of God towards Jesus our hope. 17. The Spirit and the Bride say: "Come!". The Holy Spirit and Christian hope

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

We have arrived at the end of our catecheses on the Holy Spirit and the Church. We will devote this final reflection to the title we gave to the entire cycle, namely: "The Holy Spirit and the Bride. The Holy Spirit guides the People of God towards Jesus our hope". This title refers to one of the last verses of the Bible, in the Book of Revelation, which says: "The Spirit and the bride say, 'Come'" (Rev 22:17). Who is this invocation addressed to? It is addressed to the risen Christ. Indeed, both Saint Paul (cf. 1 Cor 16:22) and the Didaché, a text from apostolic times, attest that in the liturgical meetings of the first Christians there resounded the cry in Aramaic, "Marànatha!", which indeed means "Come, Lord!". A prayer to Christ, for Him to come. At that earliest time, the invocation had a background we would describe today as eschatological. Indeed, it expressed the ardent expectation of the glorious return of the Lord. And this cry, and the expectation it expresses, have never been extinguished in the Church. Still today, in the Mass, immediately after the

consecration, she proclaims Christ's death and resurrection "as we await the blessed hope and [His] coming". The Church awaits the coming of the Lord.

But this expectation of the *final* coming of Christ has not remained the one and only. It has also been joined by the expectation of his *continuous* coming in the present and pilgrim situation of the Church. And it is this coming that the Church thinks of above all, when, animated by the Holy Spirit, she cries out to Jesus: "Come!". A change, or better, let's say, a development, full of meaning, has occurred with regard to the cry "Come", "Come, Lord!". It is not habitually addressed only to Christ, but also to the Holy Spirit Himself! He who cries out is now Him to whom we cry out "Come!" is the invocation with which we begin almost all the hymns and prayers of the Church addressed to the Holy Spirit: "Come, Holy Spirit", we say in the *Veni Creator*, and "Come, Holy Spirit", "*Veni Sancte Spiritus*", in the sequence of Pentecost, and so on, in many other prayers. It is right that it should be so, because, after the Resurrection, the Holy Spirit is Christ's true "alter ego", He who takes His place, who makes Him present and operative in the Church. It is He who "declare[s] ... the things that are coming" (cf. *Jn* 16:13) and makes them desired and expected. This is why Christ and the Spirit are inseparable, also in the economy of salvation.

The Holy Spirit is the ever-gushing source of Christian hope. Saint Paul left us these precious words, this is what Paul says: "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit" (Rm 15:13). If the Church is a boat, the Holy Spirit is the sail that propels it and lets it advance on the sea of history, today as in the past! Hope is not an empty word, or a vague desire of ours that things may turn out for the best; hope is a certainty, because it is founded on God's fidelity to His promises. And this is why it is called a theological virtue: because it is infused by God and has God as its guarantor. It is not a passive virtue, which merely waits for things to happen. It is a supremely active virtue that helps make them happen. Someone who fought for the liberation of the poor wrote these words: "The Holy Spirit is at the origin of the cry of the poor. He is the strength given to those who have no strength. He leads the struggle for the emancipation and full realization of the people of the oppressed".

The Christian cannot be satisfied with *having* hope; he or she must also *radiate* hope, be a sower of hope. It is the most beautiful gift that the Church can give to all of humanity, especially at times in which everything seems to be dragging down the sails.

The apostle Peter exhorted the first Christians with these words: "Sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts. Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope". But he added a recommendation: "But do it with gentleness and reverence" (1 Pt 3:15-16). And this is because it is not so

much the strength of the arguments that will convince people, but rather the love that we know how to put in them. This is the first and most effective form of evangelization. And it is open to everyone!

Dear brothers and sisters, may the Spirit always, always help us to "abound in hope by virtue of the Holy Spirit! Thank you.

APPEAL.

Every day I am following what is happening in Syria, in this moment that is so delicate in its history. I hope that a political solution may be reached that, without further conflicts or divisions, may responsibly promote the stability and unity of the country. Summary of the Holy Father's words:

Dear Brothers and Sisters: In this final catechesis on the Holy Spirit and the Church, we consider the Spirit as the source of the Church's hope for the Lord's return in glory and the fulfilment of his saving plan at the end of time. The New Testament ends with the Spirit and the Bride, the Church, crying out in ardent expectation, "Come, Lord Jesus" (cf. Rev 22:17.20). The Church's tradition likewise invokes the Spirit with the ancient prayer, "Come, Holy Spirit", asking that he confirm our trust in Christ's promises and strengthen us in fidelity to our mission of bearing witness to the hope offered by the Gospel. As Christians, we are called not only to have hope but also to radiate hope, so that all may come to know the Lord and joyfully await the coming of his kingdom of holiness, justice and peace.

2. Cycle of Catechesis – Jubilee 2025. Jesus Christ our Hope. I. The Infancy of Jesus. 1. Genealogy of Jesus (Mt 1,1-17). The entry of the Son of God in history.

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

Today we will begin the cycle of catechesis that will continue throughout the Jubilee Year. The theme is "Jesus Christ our Hope": for He is the aim of our pilgrimage, and He Himself is the way, the path to follow. The first part will look at

the childhood of Jesus, which is narrated to us by the Evangelists Matthew and Luke (cf. Mt 1-2; Lk 1-2). The Infancy Gospels recount Jesus' virginal conception and His birth from Mary's womb; they recall the messianic prophecies fulfilled in Him and speak of the legal paternity of Joseph, who grafted the Son of God onto the "trunk" of the Davidic dynasty. We are presented with an infant, child and adolescent Jesus, submissive to his parents and, at the same time, aware that He is wholly devoted to the Father and His Kingdom. The difference between the two Evangelists is that while Luke recounts the events through Mary's eyes, Matthew does so through Joseph's, insisting on this unprecedented fatherhood.

Matthew begins His Gospel and the entire New Testament canon with the 'genealogy of Jesus Christ, the son of David, the son of Abraham' (*Mt* 1:1). It is a list of names already present in the Hebrew Scriptures, to show the truth of history and the truth of human life. In fact, "the Lord's genealogy consists of the true story that includes a number of figures who are problematic to say the least, and the sin of King David is also emphasized (cf. *Mt* 1:6). Yet, everything culminates with Mary and Christ (cf. *Mt* 1:16)" (*Letter on the Renewal of the Study of Church History*, 21 November 2024). Then, there appears the truth of human life that passes from one generation to the next, bringing three things: a name that encompasses a unique identity and mission; belonging to a family and a people; and finally, the adherence of faith to the God of Israel.

Genealogy is a literary genre, that is, a form suitable for conveying a very important message: no one gives life to himself, but receives it as a gift from others. In this case, the chosen people, and those who inherit the legacy of faith from their forefathers, in passing on life to their children, also convey to them the faith in God. Unlike the genealogies of the Old Testament, however, where only male names appear – because in Israel it is the father who imposes the name on his son – in Matthew's list of Jesus' ancestors, women also appear. We find five of them: Tamar, the daughter-in-law of Judah who, left a widow, pretends to be a prostitute in order to ensure an offspring for her husband (cf. *Gen* 38); Racab, the prostitute of Jericho who allows the Jewish explorers to enter the promised land and conquer it (cf. *Jas* 2); Ruth, the Moabite who, in the book of the same name, remains faithful to her mother-in-law, takes care of her and will become King David's great-grandmother; Bathsheba, with whom David commits adultery and, after having her husband killed, begets Solomon (cf. 2 Sam 11); and finally Mary of Nazareth, wife of Joseph, of the house of David: from her the Messiah, Jesus, is born.

The first four women have in common not the fact that they are sinners, as is sometimes said, but the fact that they are *foreign* to the people of Israel. What Matthew brings out is that, as Benedict XVI has written, "through them the world of the Gentiles enters ... into Jesus' genealogy - his mission to Jews and Gentiles

becomes visible" (The Infancy Narratives, Milan-Vatican City 2012, 15). While the four previous women are mentioned alongside the man who was born of them or the one who begot him, Mary, on the other hand, acquires particular prominence: she marks a new beginning. She herself is a new beginning, because in her story it is no longer the human creature who is the protagonist of generation, but God Himself. This is clearly seen from the verb "was born": "Jacob [was] the father of Joseph the husband of Mary, of whom Jesus was born" (Mt 1:16). Jesus is the son of David, grafted by Joseph into that dynasty and destined to be the Messiah of Israel, but He is also the son of Abraham and of foreign women, destined therefore to be the "Light of the Gentiles" (cf. Lk 2:32) and the "Saviour of the world" (In 4:42). The Son of God, consecrated to the Father with the mission of revealing His face (cf. *In* 1:18; *In* 14:9), enters the world like all children of man, so much so that in Nazareth He will be called "son of Joseph" (In 6:42) or "son of the carpenter" (Mt 13:55). True God and true man. Brothers and sisters, let us awaken in ourselves the grateful memory of our ancestors. And above all, let us give thanks to God, who, through Mother Church, has generated us to eternal life, the life of Jesus, our hope.

Dear brothers and sisters, let us pray for peace. Let us not forget the people who suffer because of war: Palestine, Israel, and all those who are suffering, Ukraine, Myanmar... Let us not forget to pray for peace, that the wars may end. Let us ask the Prince of Peace, the Lord, to give us this grace: peace, peace in the world. War, lest we forget, is always a defeat, always! War is always a defeat.

Summary of the Holy Father's words:

Dear brothers and sisters: We now begin a new series of catecheses for the Holy Year on the Jubilee theme of "Jesus Christ our Hope." Today we reflect on the Gospel accounts of Jesus' genealogy, which remind us that his life and identity belong to a greater history that embraces his ancestry, his family and the faith of the entire people of Israel. The presence of four Gentile women in Matthew's genealogy reminds us that Jesus was ultimately sent to be the Saviour of all peoples. The birth of Jesus from the Virgin Mary is itself a sign of a new beginning for our human family. As Christmas approaches, let us give thanks for our own genealogy, and renew our commitment to embody the gifts of reconciliation, peace and hope which our Lord brought into this world by his Incarnation.
