## Archbishop's Message



Haveyou ever imagined a prayer to 'the most beautiful person,'with 'the most beautiful words' and with 'the most beautiful request'? It may be well beyond our means to do so! But God in His supreme goodnesshas given us such a prayer. It is 'the Hail Mary!'

The 'most beautiful person' is none other than the BlessedVirgin Mary. She is the one who was greeted by Archangel Gabriel with the divinely inspired words 'Hail Mary!'

The 'most beautiful words': Sheis the one who heard the sameArchangel utter the 'most beautiful words' to her, revealing the unspeakableand divine radiance bestowed on her by the BlessedTrinity in the singular grace of her Immaculate Conception, namely 'full of grace', at the very moment of her creation as a human person in the womb of her holy mother St. Ann, to serve Him indefectibly in the eschatologicalfulfilment of His definitive verdict against the Devil after the fall of Adam, and in the eschatological restoration of the fallen human race to Himself in Christ JesusHis Son and in His Holy Spirit: 'The Lord is with you!' ## Solemnities and Feasts

## 1<sup>ST</sup> OCTOBER





On October 1, Catholics around the world honor the life of St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus, or St. Thérèse of Lisieux on her feast day. St. Thérèse was born January 2, 1873 in Alençon, France to pious parents, both of whom are scheduled to be canonized in October 2016. Her mother died when she was four, leaving her father and elder sisters to raise her.

On Christmas Day 1886 St. Thérèse had a profound experience of intimate union with God, which she described as a "complete conversion." Almost a year later, in a papal audience during a pilgrimage to Rome, in 1887, she asked for and obtained permission from Pope Leo XIII to enter the Carmelite Monastery at the young age of 15.

On entering, she devoted herself to living a life of holiness, doing all things with love and childlike trust in God. Shestruggled with life in the convent, but decided to make an effort to be charitable to all, especially those she didn't like. She performed little acts of charity always, and little sacrifices not caring how unimportant they seemed. These acts helped her come to a deeper understanding of her vocation.

Shewrote in her autobiography that she had always dreamed of being a missionary, an Apostle, a martyr – yet she was a nun in a quiet cloister in France. How could she fulfill these longings?

"Charity gaveme the key to my vocation. I understood that the Church had a Heart and that this Heart was burning with love. I knew that one love drove the members of the Church to action, that if this love were extinguished, the apostles would have proclaimed the Gospel no longer, the martyrs would have shed their blood no more. I understood that Love comprised all vocations, that Love was everything, that it embraced all times and places...inaword, that it was eternal! Then in the excessof my delirious joy, I cried out: OJesus, my Love...myvocation, at last I have found it...My vocation is Love!"

Thérèse offered herself as a sacrificial victim to the merciful Love of Godon June 9, 1895, the feast of the Most Holy Trinity and the following year, on the night between Holy Thursday and Good Friday, she noticed the first symptoms of Tuberculosis, the illness which would lead to her death.

Thérèserecognized in her illness the mysterious visitation of the divine Spouseandwelcomed the suffering as an answer to her offering the previous year. She also began to undergo a terrible trial of faith which lasteduntil her death a year and a half later. "Her last words, 'My God, Ilove you,' are the seal of her life," said Pope John Paul II.

Since her death, millions have been inspired by her 'little way' of loving God and neighbor. Many miracles have been attributed to her intercession. She had predicted during her earthly life that "My Heavenwill be spent doing good on Earth."

Saint Thérèse was proclaimed a Doctor of the Churchby PopeJohnPaul II in 1997 - 100 years after her death at the age of 24. She is only the third woman to be so proclaimed, after Saint Catherine of Siena and Saint Teresa of Avila.

St. Thérèse wrote once, 'You know well enough that Our Lord does not look so much at the greatness of our actions, nor even at their difficulty, but at the love with which we do them."

## 18TH OCTOBER

## ST. LUKE, EVANGELIST

Luke, author of the Gospel and Acts of the Apostles, is identified as "Luke, the beloved physician" (Colossians 4:14). He was likely a Greek and a Gentile, born in Antioch, Syria. Some scholars suggest he may even have been a well-educated slave trained in medicine.



Luke joined Paul at Troas around the year 51 (Acts 16:10, where "they" becomes "we"). He accompanied Paul through

Macedoniaandlater rejoined him on his third journey (Acts 20:5). Luke remained a loyal companion, staying with Paul during his imprisonments and was the only one with him at the end (2 Timothy 4:11).

Luke's Gospel, written after careful investigation (Luke 1:1–3), is known for its compassion and inclusiveness. It highlights Jesus'concern for the poor, Gentiles, women, and sinners. Unique to Luke are parables like the GoodSamaritan, the Prodigal Son, and the Rich Man and Lazarus, as well as the Annunciation, the Magnificat, and stories about Mary. He emphasizes God's mercy and justice: "Blessedare the poor" and "He has lifted up the lowly" (Luke 1:52–53).

Tradition about Luke's later life is uncertain-some say he preached in Greeceor Gaul, others that he died at 84 in Boeotia. The claim that he was a painter is legendary, though he is often depicted with an ox, symbolizing sacrifice. Luke is honored as the patron saint of physicians, surgeons, and painters.

## STS. SIMON AND JUDE, APOSTLES

ST. SIMON

#### St. Simon the Zealot

Simon is listed among the Twelve Apostlesin the Gospels(Luke 6:15; Acts 1:13). He is called *the Zealot*—which may mean he once belonged to the JewishZealotmovement or simply that he was deeply zealousfor God's law. The Scriptures do not record any words or deeds of Simon, but tradition remembers him as a fervent missionary who carried the Gospelfar beyond Palestine. St. Simonis often depicted with a saw, symbolizing his martyrdom.

# THE APOSILE THE APOSILE

ST. JUDE

#### St. Jude Thaddeus

Jude, also called *Thaddeus*or *Lebbaeus*, is sometimes referred to as "Jude of James" (Luke 6:16). He is not Judas Iscariot, the betrayer, but another Apostle who remained faithful. At the Last Supper, Judeasked Jesus,

"Lord, how is it that you will reveal yourself to us, and not to the world?" (John 14:22), showing his desire for all peopleto know Christ. Heis the traditional author of the short Letter of Judein the New Testament, which urges believers to remain steadfastin the true faith. Devotion to St. Judegrew in later centuries, and he is especially honoured today as the patron of desperate and hopelesscauses. St. Judeis shown holding a club, or sometimes an image of Christ known as the "Image of Edessa," recalling a legend that he carried an image of Jesusto heal a king.

## Their Mission and Martyrdom

Ancient tradition holdsthat Simon and Judetravelledtogether as missionaries, preaching the Gospelin Mesopotamia and Persia (modern-day Iran). Both suffered martyrdom for Christ, some sources say Simon was martyred by being sawed in two, while Judewas killed with a club or axe. Becausethey shared their missionary journeys and martyrdom, the Church celebrates their feast together on **October 28**. Together, they are honoured as tireless missionaries who brought hope and the light of Christ to distant lands.

#### 1. MONTH OF OCTOBERIS DEDICATED TO THE HOLY ROSARY

The Church dedicates the month of October to the Holy Rosary. This is a grace-filled time to renew our commitment to praying the Rosary daily. The Rosary is a powerful instrument of conversion, a source of peace and holiness in our lives, and one of the most effective ways of honouring Our Blessed Mother.

The Rosaryis often called the "Gospelin miniature," for in meditating upon its mysteries, we walk with Mary through the life of Christ. It strengthens families, protects against evil, deepenspersonal faith, and brings countless blessings to those who pray it with devotion. The saints and popes throughout history have constantly reminded us that the Rosary has the power to change hearts and even transform the course of history.

The simplicity and depth of this prayer make it most suitablefor our human condition, fostering a profound devotion to Our Lady of the Rosary. We encourage you to organize special programmes in the parishes during this month and to inspire the faithful to grow in love and devotion to Our Lady through the regular recitation of the Holy Rosary. Let us remind the people that when we pray the Rosary, we placeour lives and our families under the maternal protection of Mary, who always leadsus closer to Jesus.

## 2. MISSION SUNDAY CELEBRATION ON 19th OCTOBER, 2025

As the Church prepares to celebrate **World Mission Sunday** on *October 19, 2025*, the Holy Father has given us a powerful theme for this Jubilee Year: "*Missionaries of Hope Among All Peoples.*"In his message, the Popereminds us that **hope is at the very heart of the Christian mission**, and every disciple is called to be a bearer of this hope to the world.

All **Parish Priests, Priests-in-Charge, and Headsof Institutions** are earnestly requested to observe Mission Sundaywith due solemnity. On this occasion, the clergy are encouraged to **highlight the message of the Holy Father** during the homily, as published in this edition of *Shepherd's Call* (see pages 32-35).

Let us remember our common responsibility and respond with faith and generosity by:

 Prayingfervently for the missions-fortheir growth, and for all missionaries who courageously proclaim the Word of God.

- Promoting vocations to the Priesthood and Religious Life, so that the mission
  of the Church may continue to flourish.
- Makinggenerousofferingsand contributions on Mission Sundayto support the missions and the missionaries across the world.

May this Mission Sundayrenew in us the zeal to be true witnesses of Christ's hope and love, becoming **missionaries of hope among all peoples**.

## 3. LITURGICAL NORMS FOR PRIESTS CONCELEBRATING THE EUCHARIST

From time to time, questions arise regarding the proper participation of priests in concelebrated Masses, particularly in situations of late arrival or unforeseen necessity. I wish to recall the mind of the Church, as expressed in the **General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM)**, the **Instruction Redemptionis Sacramentum (2004)**, and the **Directives of the Congregation for Divine Worship**.

The **GIRM** (**nos**. 206–209) makesclearthat concelebrantsare to vest, join the entrance procession, and take part in the Introductory Rites together with the principal celebrant. Thevery structure of concelebration presumes full participation from the beginning. According to **GIRM no**. 212, a priest who arrives only after Masshas begun, is not to join the concelebration. Instead, he may attend in clerical dress and, in accord with **no**. 214, receive Holy Communion under both species, like the faithful

The Instruction RedemptionisSacramentum(RS) (nos.128–129) reminds us that the Eucharist must always be celebrated on conformity with the liturgical books, without anything that introduces disorder or detractsfrom the sacredness of the rite. In the same spirit, the Congregation for Divine Worship insists that priests who comelateare not to insert themselves into a concelebration once it has commenced.

Furthermore, the **GIRM** (**no. 93**) emphasizes that the priest presides over the *entire celebration* from the chair and the altar. This presiding is continuous and does not allow for handing over midway, except in a case of grave necessity. **GIRM no. 210** underscores that concelebrants must be present for the whole Eucharistic Celebration. **GIRM no. 207** allows substitution of the principal celebrant only if suddenillness or another grave reason arises, and then the Mass must continue seamlessly.

## Therefore, I remind all priests:

- The Eucharist is one singleact of worship.
- A priest may not voluntarily withdraw after the homily (nor comeonly to deliver the homily and then leave) or at any other point of the Mass(cf. GIRM 93; RS 128).
- Replacementis justified only in cases of serious and unforeseen necessity, such as suddenillness or urgent pastoral emergency (cf. GIRM 207; RS129).
- In such circumstances, the liturgy must continue seamlessly without interruption (cf. GIRM 207; RS129).
- Concelebrantsarerequired to be present from the beginning of Massuntil its conclusion (cf. GIRM 206–210; RS128).
- A priest arriving lateshouldnot vest and join midway, but may attend in clerical dress and receive Holy Communion (cf. GIRM 212, 214; RS128).
- Onceentered into concelebration, a priest is bound to remain until the end (cf. GIRM 210; RS128).
- The principal celebrant may be substituted only in exceptional cases of grave necessity, ensuring continuity of the celebration (cf. GIRM 207; RS129).

#### **Additional Norms on Concelebration:**

## On the Proclamation of the Gospel

 When the bishop is the principal celebrant, the deacon or concelebrant is to receive his blessing before proclaiming the Gospel (cf. GIRM 212).

## On the Eucharistic Prayer

- Concelebrantspronounce the words of consecration in a low voice, while the voice of the principal celebrantis heard clearly (cf. GIRM 218).
- At the Epiclesis, all concelebrants extend both hands over the gifts; likewise, they extend their hands at those parts of the Eucharistic Prayer that are recited together by all (cf. GIRM 222, 227, 230, 233).
- Concelebrantsshould remain in the sanctuary or in an assigned place during the Eucharistic Prayer. They approach the altar only after the Prayer over the Gifts. They are not to concelebrateif simultaneously fulfilling another role (e.g., choir, photography), since two things cannot be done at once (DCL, Do's and Don'ts, 40).

## On the Lord's Prayer

All concelebrantsextend their handsduring the Our Father (cf. GIRM 237).

#### On Communion

 Concelebrantsmust receive Holy Communion from hosts consecrated at that Mass, never from the tabernacle (DCL, Do's and Don'ts, 48).

#### On Reverence at the Altar

• Before leaving the altar, concelebrantsmake a profound bow; the principal celebrant, together with the deacon, kissesthe altar (cf. GIRM 251).

#### On Vesture

Celebrantsare not permitted to wear a stole or vestment over secular dress.

#### **On Announcements**

- Only the regular parish announcements are to be made after the *Prayer after Communion*.
- Any other programmessuch as felicitations, welcoming, farewells, or cultural itemsshould take place after the Final Blessing, preferably away from the Altar or outside the church, in order to maintain the sacred character of the liturgy. ## 2. Chanting the Responsorial Psalms. (Psalmi Responsoriiin Cantu)

Setting music for the 353 Responsorial Psalmsfoundin the 'Liturgy of the Word' was labor of devotion and below are the guiding reasons behind this project.

1. Fostering an integral Liturgical theme: I believe that every element of the Mass: prayers, readings, homily, and hymns, should be interwoven around a central, unifying theme. My hope is that each



- worshipper leavesMasswith this theme resonating within them, carrying its spiritual inspiration throughout the week until they return for the next Holy Mass.
- 2. Upholding the Liturgical Importance of the Responsorial Psalm: The Responsorial Psalmis an integral part of the Liturgy of the Word and has great liturgical and pastoral importance, since it fosters meditation on the Word of God. It must be taken from the Lectionary. It is preferable that the Responsorial Psalmbe sung, especially the response by the people. Accordingly, the psalmist or cantor proclaims the Psalmverses from the ambo or another appropriate location, while the entire congregation remains seated and attentive. The Liturgical norm GIRM61 emphasizes that "if a Psalmcannot be sung, then it should be recited in a way that is particularly suited to fostering meditation on the Word of God". Thus, the lyrics of the responsorial Psalmscannot simply be replaced by an unrelated hymn or song, regardless of their musical beauty.
- 3. Responding to the Decline in Liturgical Music Standards:Observing a decline in the quality and liturgical integrity of music in many English-languageCatholic communities including parishes, seminaries, and housesof formation, I felt compelled to use my God-given musical talent to compose settings for all Responsorial Psalms across three liturgical years, Proper of saints, Rituals including religious vows, and Needsof the Church.
- 4. Composing with purposeful innovation: So, why new composition? According to *Musicam Sacram* (MS23), there must be no innovations unless the good of the Church genuinely and certainly requires them; and care must be taken

- that any new forms adoptedshouldin someway grow organically from forms already existing. My work strives to honor this principle, blending tradition with thoughtful creativity.
- 5. Honoring Gregorian Chant as the Heart of Roman Liturgy: As per the *SacrosanctumConcilium*, Gregorian chant is "specifically suited to the Roman Liturgy" and "should be given pride of placein liturgical services." Inspired by this, I adopted the chant style for Psalm settings, echoing Pope Benedict's affirmation: "Gregorian chant is the paradigm of SacredMusic."
- 6. Embracing Polyphony in Catholic Tradition: 'The main place should be given, all things being equal, to Gregorian chant, asbeing proper to the RomanLiturgy. Other kinds of sacredmusic, in particular polyphony, are in no way excluded'—GIRM41. That is why each Psalmchorus in my collection is arranged in fourpart polyphony, a commitment that often-required days or even months to fully set music for one Responsorial Psalm.

I am grateful to the lay faithful, religious, and clergy of our Archdiocese, especially our dear Cardinal, for their encouragement during this endeavor. Aspecial thanks to St Anthony's Parish, Mudfort, where these settings were first sung and warmly received since 2014, and to the members of the Hyderabad Archdiocesan Choir (HAC), who have begun chanting these Responsorial Psalmsin their own parishes.

Institute for Families, Bangalore held the first classof the Certificate Course in Basic Counselling (part 1). The twelve-week course is being conducted at JeevanJyothi, Begumpet.

Over25 participants representing various parishes across the city, registered for and attended the course.



The program commenced with an inaugural ceremonythat began with an opening prayer, lighting of the lamp, scripture reading, and a keynote addressby the chief guest, Fr. Raju Alex. In his speech, Fr. Raju emphasized the pressing need for counselling in the present times and highlighted the role of counsellors in supporting youth, young couples, and families. Fr. David Francis, Director, Family Apostolate, in his address, stated that the vocation of a counsellor is not only noble but also rooted in compassion and empathy. He underlined the importance and power of active listening, highlighting the deephealing it can bring about.

The course curriculum has been meticulously designed with a balance of theory and practical application. It begins with foundational concepts such as the introduction to counselling, and progresses to advanced the rapeutic approaches including Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) and Rational Emotive Behaviour Therapy (REBT). The sessions are facilitated by a team of well-qualified and experienced faculty members.

In addition to classroom learning, the program integrates practicum requirements. Participants are required to undertake five sessions of personal counselling, three verbatim reports, a presentation, and a casestudy, which forms the basis for certification as Counsellors.

Over a period of twelve weeks, it is expected that the course will not only enhancethe professional skills of the participants but will also bring about personal growth and self-awareness, making the initiative both impactful and enriching.

This is the second batch of the Counselling Course by The Family Apostolate, Archdiocese of Hyderabad. The first batch was held last year with more than 30 students graduating.

## 1. The Annual Meeting of the Telugu Catholic Bishops' Council (TCBC) Regional Directors and Commissions' Secretaries

The Annual Meeting of the Telugu Catholic Bishops' Council (TCBC)Regional Directors and Commissions' Secretaries was held on September 10, 2025, at Jyotirmai Hall, TCBCCentre, Sikh Village, Secunderabad. The event brought together delegates from across Andhra Pradeshand Telanganato present their annual reports,



share challenges, review progress, and plan future initiatives for the mission of the Church in the region. The day began with a Holy Mass, followed by an opening prayer led by Fr. Raju Alex A.E., Deputy Secretary of TCBC. Bishop T. Joseph Raja Rao, General Secretary and Treasurer of TCBC, extended a warm welcome to all the attendees and delivered the opening address. In his remarks, Bishop Raja Rao emphasised the importance of transparent reporting of performance, ongoing programmes, challenges, and future goals by each delegate. He further encouraged participants by acknowledging their successstories and contributions over the past year.

During the meeting, detailed presentations were made by the regional directors of institutions, including Amruthavani Communications Centre, Divya Vani, Andhra Pradesh Jyotirmai Society, APSSS, APSSF, Jeevan Trust, and Bharathamithram Society. The secretaries of the various TCBC commissions then presented their reports. The commissions included Canon Law, Theology, Catechetics, Ecumenism & Interfaith Dialogue, Bible, Education, Health, Liturgy, Youth, Prison Ministry, SC/BC, Tribal Affairs, Vocations, ATCRI, Charismatic Renewal, Justice & Ecology, Proclamation, Migrants, and the Telugu Catholic Council.

The sessionsduring the meeting, moderated by various directors and secretaries, enabled meaningful dialogue, reflection on the past year's activities, and sharing of best practices. The meeting concluded with observations from Bishop T. Joseph Raja Rao, who expressed gratitude to all contributors for their efficient reporting and for their fellowship.

## 2. THE TELUGU CATHOLIC BISHOPS' COUNCIL EXTRAORDINARY MEETING – 2025

The Telugu Catholic Bishops' Council (TCBC) Extraordinary Meeting was

held from 23<sup>rd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> September 2025. The meeting opened with prayer and words of welcome from His Eminence Cardinal Poola Anthony. During the inaugural session, the bishops felicitated Most Rev. Prince Anthony, the first Archbishop-elect of Shamshabad, and Mar JosephThachaparambath, CMI, the Bishop-elect of Adilabad Diocese.

In the second session, the CEOof Divyavani Communications presented a

report, announcing the grand release of the film *The Faceof the Faceless*(the story of Sr. Rani Maria), dubbed in Telugu by Divyavani. Updateswere also given on the construction of the new **Divyavani Social Communication and Amruthavani Communication Centre**, scheduledto be inaugurated on **15th November 2025**.



**Fr. Lourduraj SJ**reported on the TCBCcomplex, noting the installation of a new lift, ground-floor renovations, and full occupancyof rental spacesgenerating an annual income of Rs.1 crore. **Most Rev. Vijay Kumar Rayrala**, Chairman of the Commission for Youth, highlighted the upcoming **National Youth Jubilee Convention** (1st–5th October 2025, Divine Retreat Centre, Potta, Kerala), in which many youth from the Teluguregion will participate.

The **Montfort Brothers of the Hyderabad Province** submitted a request for land to establish inclusive schools, though the final decision was deferred to the seminary governing body. The Council also confirmed that the next ordinary meeting of the TCBCwill be held on **4th–6th March 2026**.

The day concluded with the session of the **Federation of Telugu Churches** (FTC). Though attendancewas modest, nine TCBCbishops participated. **Most Rev. Johannes Gorantla, Bishop of Kurnool**, gave an address on the **1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed**, tracing its history and explaining the significance of the upcoming celebration. The session closed with prayers and benediction.

The seconddaybeganwith prayer, followed by words of welcome and a review by Cardinal Poola Anthony.

Fr. Joe Xavier SJgave an insightful input on "The CCBIPastoral Plan and Synodality: A New Way of Being the Church", which inspired bishops and commission secretaries. Later, Most Rev. Moses D. Prakasam, Bishop of Nellore, released three volumes of the Adult Catechismin Telugu.

In the third session, the TCBCbishops met with the **ATRCRI**, represented by **Fr. Stany SJ** on behalf of **Fr. Thomas Santiagu SDB**. Three key issues were discussed:

- 1. Collaboration of religious with the TCBCin implementing the **Mission 2033 Pastoral Plan**.
- 2. Addressingchallengesfaced by the Church and religious communities.
- 3. Providing concessions in Catholic schools for Catholic students.

The discussion was fruitful, and it was decided to grant 50% concessions for deserving students from poor backgrounds. Bishops and ATRCRImembers further reflected on challenges and on advancing the mission of the Church in a truly synodal way.

The final day was dedicated to the **Telugu Catholic Council (TCC)**. **Fr. Raju Alex** welcomed the assembly, and **Most Rev. T. Joseph Raja Rao** offered introductory remarks, highlighting the importance of the TCCand its activities. Members introduced themselves, the minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed, and matters arising were addressed, with requests that TCBCconsider recommendations from 2024.

**Fr. Joji Babu**, professor at St. John's Regional Seminary, presented a scintillating session on "Lay Leadership", accompanied by a PPT. He initiated group discussions by dividing members into six groups, each tasked with responding to three key questions. Their reports will serve as recommendations for the TCBC.

**Cardinal Poola Anthony**, President of the TCBC, expressed gratitude to **Bishop T. Joseph Raja Rao** for his observations, and encouraged TCC members to take active roles in their dioceses and support the upcoming Jubilee Mini-Conventions in both ecclesia stical provinces of the Teluguregion.

The meeting concluded with the Angelus, final prayer, and blessing. Cardinal PoolaAnthony thanked the bishops, TCCmembers, and in a special way, Fr. Lourdu Marreddy, Rector of St. John's Seminary, for his support in ensuring the successof this three-day extraordinary meeting.



## MESSAGEOFHIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR WORLD MISSION DAY 2025 19 October 2025

## Missionaries of Hope Among all Peoples

Dear brothers and sisters!

For World Mission Day in the JubileeYear 2025, the central message of which is hope (cf. Bull *SpesNonConfundit*, 1), I have chosen the motto: "Missionaries of Hope Among all Peoples". It reminds individual Christians and the entire Church, the community of the baptized, of our fundamental vocation to be, in the footstepsof Christ, messengers and builders of hope. I trust that it will be for everyone a time of grace with the faithful Godwho has given us new birth in the risen Christ "to a living hope" (cf. 1 Pet1:3-4). Here, I would like to mention some relevant aspects of our Christian missionary identity, so that we can let ourselves be guided by the Spirit of God and burn with holy zeal for a new evangelizing season in the Church, which is sent to revive hope in a world over which dark shadowsloom (cf. Fratelli Tutti, 9-55).

#### 1. In the footstepsof Christ our hope

Celebratingthe first Ordinary Jubileeof the Third Millennium after that of the Holy Year of 2000, we keep our gazefixed on Christ, the centre of history, "the same yesterday and today and forever" (*Heb* 13:8). In the synagogue of Nazareth, Jesus declaredthat Scripture was fulfilled in the "today" of his presencein history. He thus revealedthat he is the Onesent by the Father with the anointing of the Holy Spirit to proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom of God and to inaugurate "the year of the Lord's favour" for all humanity (cf. *Lk* 4:16-21).

In this mystic "today", which will lastuntil the end of the world, Christ is the fullness of salvation for all, and in a particular way for those whose only hope is God. In his earthly life, "he went about doing good and healing all" from evil and the Evil One (cf. *Acts*10:38), restoring hope in God to the needy and the people. He experienced all our human frailties, savethat of sin, eventhose critical moments that might lead to despair, as in the agony in the garden of Gethsemane and on the cross. Jesus commended everything to God the Father, obediently trusting in his saving plan for humanity, a plan of peacefor a future full of hope (cf. *Jer*29:11). In this way, he became the divine Missionary of hope, the supreme model of all those down the centuries who carry out their own God-givenmission, even amid extreme trials.

Through his disciples, sent to all peoples and mystically accompanied by him, the Lord Jesuscontinues his ministry of hope for humanity. He still bendsover all those who are poor, afflicted, despairing and oppressed, and pours "upon their wounds the

balm of consolation and the wine of hope" (*Preface "Jesusthe Good Samaritan"*). Obedient to her Lord and Master, and in the same spirit of service, the Church, the community of Christ's missionary disciples, prolongs that mission, offering her life for all in the midst of the nations. While facing persecutions, tribulations and difficulties, as well as her own imperfections and failures due to the weaknessof her members, the Church is constantly impelled by the love of Christ to persevere, in union with him, on her missionary journey and to hear, like him and with him, the pleaof suffering humanity and, indeed, the groaning of every creature that awaits definitive redemption. This is the Church that the Lord always and for ever callsto follow in his footsteps: "not a static Church, but a missionary Church that walks with her Lord through the streetsof the world" (*Homily at the Concluding Massof the Ordinary General Assembly of the Synodof Bishops*, 27 October 2024).

May we too feel inspired to set out in the footstepsof the Lord Jesusto become, with him and in him, signs and messengers of hope for all, in every place and circumstance that God has granted us to live. May all the baptized, as missionary disciples of Christ, make his hope shine forth in every corner of the earth!

## 2. Christians, bearers and builders of hope among all peoples

In following Christ the Lord, Christians are called to hand on the GoodNews by sharing the concretelife situations of those whom they meet, and thus to be bearers and builders of hope. Indeed, "the joys and hopes, the grief and anguish of the people of our time, especially of those who are poor or afflicted, are the joys and hopes, the grief and anguish of the followers of Christ as well. Nothing that is genuinely human fails to find an echo in their hearts" (*Gaudiumet Spes*1).

This celebrated statement of the Second Vatican Council, which expresses the sentiment and style of Christian communities in every age, continues to inspire their members and helps them to walk with their brothers and sisters in the world. Here I think especially of those of you who are missionaries *ad gentes*. Following the Lord's call, you havegone forth to other nations to make known the love of Godin Christ. For this, I thank you most heartily! Your lives are a clear response to the command of the risen Christ, who sent his disciples to evangelize all peoples (cf. *Mt* 28:18-20). In this way, you are signs of the universal vocation of the baptized to become, by the power of the Spirit and daily effort, missionaries among all peoples and witnesses to the great hope given us by the Lord Jesus.

The horizon of this hope transcendsthe passing things of this world and opens up to those divine realities in which we share even now. Indeed, as Saint Paul VI observed, salvation in Christ, which the Church offers to all as a gift of God's mercy, is not only "immanent, meeting material or even spiritual needs...completely caught up in temporal desires, hopes, affairs, and struggles. Rather, it exceeds all such limits in order to reachful filment in a communion with the one Absolute, which is God. It is

a salvation both transcendent and eschatological, which indeed has its beginning in this life, but is fulfilled in eternity" (*EvangeliiNuntiandi*, 27).

Impelled by this great hope, Christian communities can be harbingers of a new humanity in a world that, in the most "developed" areas, shows serious symptoms of human crisis: a widespread sense of bewilderment, loneliness and indifference to the needs of the elderly, and a reluctance to make an effort to assist our neighbours in need. In the most technologically advanced nations, "proximity" is disappearing: we are all interconnected, but not related. Obsession with efficiency and an attachment to material things and ambitions are making us self-centred and incapable of altruism. The Gospel, experienced in the life of a community, can restore us to a whole, healthy, redeemed humanity.

For this reason, I once more invite all of us to carry out the works mentioned in the Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee (Nos.7-15), with particular attention to the poorest and weakest, the sick, the elderly and those excluded from materialistic and consumerist society. And to do so with God's "style": with closeness, compassion and tenderness, cultivating a personal relationship with our brothers and sisters in their specific situation (cf. Evangelii Gaudium, 127-128). Often they are the oneswho teach us how to live in hope. Through personal contact, we will also convey the love of the compassionateheart of the Lord. We will come to realize that "the heart of Christ...is the very core of the initial preaching of the Gospel" (Dilexit Nos, 32). By drawing from this source, we can offer with simplicity the hope we have received from God (cf. 1 Pet 1:21) and bring to others the same consolation with which we have been consoled by God(cf. 2Cor1:3-4). In the human and divine heart of Jesus, Godwantsto speak to the heart of every man and woman, drawing all of us to his love. "We have been sent to continue this mission: to be signs of the heart of Christ and the love of the Father, embracing the whole world" (Addressto Participants in the General Assembly of the Pontifical Mission Societies, 3 June 2023).

## 3. Renewing the mission of hope

Facedwith the urgency of the mission of hope today, Christ's disciples are called first to discover how to become "artisans" of hope and restorers of an often distracted and unhappy humanity.

To this end, we need to be renewed in the Easterspirituality experienced at every Eucharistic celebration and especially during the Easter Triduum, the centre and culmination of the liturgical year. We have been baptized into the redemptive death and resurrection of Christ, into the Passoverof the Lord that marks the eternal springtime of history. Consequently, we are a "springtime people", brimming with hope to be shared with all, since in Christ "we believe and know that death and hate are not the final word" pronounced on human existence (cf. *Catechesis*,23 August 2017). From the paschalmysteries, made present in liturgical celebrations and in the sacraments, we constantly draw upon the power of the Holy Spirit in order to work

with zeal, determination and patience in the vast field of global evangelization. "Christ, risen and glorified, is the wellspring of our hope, and he will not deprive us of the help we need to carry out the mission which he has entrusted to us" (*Evangelii Gaudium*, 275). In him, we live and bear witness to that sacred hope which is "a gift from God and a task for Christians" (*Hope is a Light in the Night*, Vatican City 2024, 7).

Missionaries of hope are men and women of prayer, for "the person who hopes is a person who prays", in the words of VenerableCardinal François-Xavier Van Thuan, who was himself sustained in hope throughout his lengthy imprisonment thanks to the strength he received from faithful prayer and the Eucharist (cf. *The Road of Hope*, Boston, 2001, 963). Let us not forget that prayer is the primary missionary activity and at the same time "the first strength of hope" (*Catechesis*, 20May 2020).

Solet us renew the mission of hope, starting from prayer, especially prayer based on the word of Godand particularly the Psalms, that great symphony of prayer whose composer is the Holy Spirit (cf. *Catechesis*, 19June2024). The Psalmstrain us to hope amid adversity, to discern the signs of hope around us, and to have the constant "missionary" desire that Godbe praised by all peoples(cf. *Ps*41:12; 67:4). By praying, we keep alive the spark of hope lit by Godwithin us, so that it can become a great fire, which enlightens and warms everyone around us, also by those concrete actions and gestures that prayer itself inspires.

To conclude, evangelization is always a communitarian process, like Christian hope itself (cf. Benedict XVI, *SpeSalvi*, 14). That process does not end with the initial preaching of the Gospel and with Baptism, but continues with the building up of Christian communities through the accompaniment of each of the baptized along the path of the Gospel. In modern society, membership in the Church is never something achieved once for all. That is why the missionary activity of handing down and shaping a mature faith in Christ is "paradigmatic for all the Church's activity" (*Evangelii Gaudium*, 15), a work that requires communion of prayer and action. Here I would emphasize once more the importance of this missionary synodality of the Church, as well as the service rendered by the Pontifical Mission Societies in promoting the missionary responsibility of the baptized and supporting new Particular Churches. I urge all of you, children, young people, adults and the elderly, to participate actively in the common evangelizing mission of the Church by your witness of life and prayer, by your sacrifices and by your generosity. Thank you for this!

Dear sisters and brothers, let us turn to Mary, Mother of Jesus Christour hope. To her we entrust our prayer for this Jubileeandfor the years yet to come: "May the light of Christian hope illumine every man and woman, as a message of God's love addressed to all! And may the Churchbear faithful witness to this message in every part of the world!" (Bull SpesNonConfundit, 6).
