Archbishop's Message



Once again, the Son our Lord Jesus Christ gives us the happiness of joining Him in His ecclesial liturgical celebration of the Chair of St. Peter on the 22nd February this year. The 'chair of St. Peter' is the name for the Petrine office the Son established in the body of the Twelve apostles to build, from the 'right hand of His Eternal Father', the unspeakably immense everlasting supernatural edifice of the people of the new and everlasting covenant through the mission of God the Holy Spirit in them as the Spirit of Truth and the promised Holy Spirit (Ezekiel 36:26-27; 37:24-28), in eschatological fulfilment of His Eternal Father's promise to David through His prophet Nathan: 'He will build a house for My Name (Sam.7:13),' and in accordance with His infallible promise to St. Peter: 'You are Peter, and on this rock I will build My Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind of earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven (Mt.16:16-19).' On this sacred occasion it is salutarily educative to consider the services which St. Peter was called to offer the Son our Lord Jesus Christ in this multifaceted Petrine office from the day it was established by Him for the building up of His promised Church in this world on Pentecost day. The first service St. Peter was called to offer Him after the Pentecost was for the fulfilment of His mission from His Eternal Father 'to bring Jacob back to Him and that Israel might be gathered to Him' in His new and everlasting covenant (Is.49:5), which service St. Peter faithfully gave as He proclaimed to the Jews 'therefore let the whole house of Israel know with certainty that God has made him both Lord and Christ this Iesus whom you crucified...Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit....So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added. They devoted themselves to the teaching of the Apostles and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers (Acts 2:36-42). The second service that St Peter was called upon to offer Him, was to maintain the discipline of divine truth and charity in this new covenant community by his power 'to bind and to loose' as our Lord revealed in St.Peter's encounter with Ananias and Sapphira (Acts 5:1-11): Peter asked Ananias

"why has Satan filled your heart to lie to the Holy Spirit...You did not lie to us but to God" When Ananias heard these words, he fell down and died. And great fear seized all who heard of it. And when his wife came later and uttered the same lie to him. Peter said to her. "How is it that you have agreed together to put the Spirit of the Lord to the test? Look, the feet of those who have buried your husband are at the door, and they will carry you out." Immediately, she fell down at his feet and died And great fear seized the whole church and all who heard these things.' The third service St. Peter was called upon to offer our Lord was for the fulfilment of His mission from His Eternal Father to the Gentiles: 'I will give you as a light to the nations. that My salvation may reach to the end of the earth (Is.49:6b), as we read in Acts 10:1-48): 'While Peter was still speaking, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the words....Then Peter said. "Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have?" So he ordered them to be baptized in the name of the Lord Iesus.' And further. St. Peter explained the truth of this service which the Son our Lord Iesus Christ Himself had led him to offer Him which he was questioned by the Judaic Christian community in Jerusalem about the covenantal legality of baptizing Gentiles into the Lord's new covenant Church and secured their acceptance of it: "If then God gave them the same gift as He gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life" (Acts 10:17-18).' And again, when the Son our Lord had specifically chosen and educated St. Paul to serve Him in His mission to the Gentile nations which He had inaugurated through St. Peter, it was indeed through St Peter that He integrated St. Paul into the Apostolic service to His mission to the Gentiles: 'Then after three years I did go up to Jerusalem to visit Cephas and stayed with him fifteen days (Gal.1:18).' And fifteen years later when St. Paul joined St. Peter in the Council of the apostles and elders in Ierusalem to resolve the contentious demand for the circumcision of the Gentile Christians (Acts 15:12), it was through St. Peter that our Lord decisively reiterated His choice of St. Paul as His divinely ordained Apostle to the Gentiles: When they saw that I had been entrusted with the gospel for the uncircumcised, just as Peter had been entrusted with the gospel for the circumcised...and when James and Cephas and Iohn recognized the grace that had been given to me, they gave to Barnabas and to me the right hand of fellowship (Gal.2:7-9).' And it was on this occasion that the Son our Lord Iesus Christ secured through St. Peter the unity of 'one flock' composed at once and at all times of Judeo Christians and Gentiles Christians and revealed this as the imperative, dominant and permanent service required of him in the Petrine office (Acts 15:6-29).' On this occasion of our liturgical celebration of the Chair of St. Peter the Holy Spirit surely invites the fervent faithful to grow in their knowledge of the Son our Lord Jesus Christ by employing their discerning minds to discover these various facets of the Petrine office in the humble and persevering service Pope Francis has been offering the Son our Lord Jesus Christ from this Apostolic office from the time he entered it, for the praise and glory of the Eternal Father.

Solemnities and Feasts

FEBRUARY 02

Presentation of the Lord (Feast)



This feast commemorates how Jesus, as a baby, was presented to God in the Temple in Jerusalem. This presentation finds its complete and perfect fulfilment in the mystery of the passion, death and Resurrection of the Lord. The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is a combined feast, commemorating the Jewish practice of the purification of the mother after childbirth and the presentation of the child to God in the Temple and his buying back (redemption) from God. It is also known as the Feast of the Purification of Mary, and the Feast of Candlemas. It is also called the Feast of Encounter (Hypapánte in Greek) because the New Testament, represented by the baby Jesus, encountered the Old Testament, represented by Simeon and Anna. Joseph offered two pigeons in the Temple as sacrifice for the purification of Mary after her childbirth and for the presentation and redemption ceremonies performed for baby Jesus.

FEBRUARY 04

St. John de Britto, Priest and Martyr

John de Brito (João de Brito, 1647-1693) was one of the earliest Jesuit missionaries in India to adopt elements of the local culture in his evangelization. He was eventually martyred because of his success and his steadfast refusal to accept honors and safety. He was born of Portuguese aristocracy and became a member of the royal court at age nine and a companion to the young prince later to become King Peter II. When de Brito was young, he almost died of an illness and his mother vowed he would wear a Jesuit cassock for a year if he were spared. He regained his health and walked around court like a miniature Jesuit, but there was nothing small about his heart or the desire that grew to actually become a Jesuit Despite pressure from the prince and the king, he entered the Jesuit novitiate in Lisbon Dec. 17, 1662 when he was only 15 years-old. He studied classics, with an interruption because of health problems, then philosophy. He wrote to the superior general in



1668 asking to be sent to the east as a missionary, but had to finish theology first. He was ordained in February 1673 and left Lisbon for Goa in mid-March, arriving the following September. He studied more theology in Goa and was asked to remain as a teacher but he desired to be a missionary and to seek the glory of martyrdom.

FEBRUARY 07

St. Gonsalo Garcia, Martyr



In 1627, Garcia and his fellow martyrs were declared as Venerable by Pope Urban VIII. The martyr's feast day occurs on Feb 5th and in 1629, their veneration was permitted throughout the Catholic Church. On June 8, 1862 Garcia was declared a saint by Pope Pius IX.

saint Gonsalo Garcia (1556-1597) is a Roman Catholic saint from India. Born in the western coastal town of Vasai, an exurb of the city of Bombay, he preached from the Bassein fort during the time the town was under Portuguese colonial rule. The feast of St. Garcia has traditionally been held on the first Sunday nearest to the neap tide following Christmas in Vasai.

Gonsalo Garcia was born Gundi Slavus Garcia- to a Portuguese father and a Canarese (resident of the Konkan coast) mother in Bassein, on February 5, 1557. He was the right hand of father St. Peter Baptist Superior of Franciscan mission in Japan. He was tutored by Fr. Sebastian Gonçalves, a Jesuit priest working in Vasai, in the college near Bassein fort. Garcia studied under the tutelage of the Jesuits for eight years from 1564 to 1572. Then, at the age of fifteen, Fr. Sebastian took Garcia to Japan. He soon managed to learn the language and since was seen as an affable person; he soon became popular in the local community as a catechist. He resigned and left to Alcao to set up trade. His business prospered and branches were opened in different locales in Southeast Asia.

Gonsalo's long cherished dream to be a Jesuit did not materialise and moved on to Manila in the Philippines as a lay missionary. In the Philippines, he was influenced by a Franciscan priest, Fr. Peter Baptista and soon joined the Seraphic Order as a lay brother. After working with the leprosy patients there he was formally ordained as a Franciscan as the Friars Minor at Manila.

FEBRUARY 22

Chair of St. Peter, The Apostle (Feast)

This feast commemorates Christ's choosing Peter to sit in his place as the servant-authority of the whole Church.

After the "lost weekend" of pain, doubt, and self-torment, Peter hears the Good News. Angels at the tomb say to Magdalene, "The Lord has risen! Go, tell his disciples and Peter." John relates that when he and Peter ran to the tomb, the younger outraced the older, then waited for him. Peter entered, saw the wrappings on the ground, the headpiece rolled up in a place by itself. John saw and believed. But he adds a reminder: "…[T]hey did not yet understand the scripture that he had to rise from the dead" (John 20:9). They went home.



There the slowly exploding, impossible idea became reality. Jesus appeared to them as they waited fearfully behind locked doors. "Peace be with you," he said (John 20:21b), and they rejoiced. Only then can Peter fulfil the task Jesus had given him: "... Once you have turned,

back, you must strengthen your brothers" (Luke 22:32). He at once becomes the spokesman for the Twelve about their experience of the Holy Spirit-before the civil authorities who wished to quash their preaching, before the Council of Jerusalem, for the community in the problem of Ananias and Sapphira. He is the first to preach the Good News to the Gentiles. The healing power of Jesus in him is well attested: the raising of Tabitha from the dead, the cure of the crippled beggar. People carry the sick into the streets so that when Peter passed his shadow might fall on them.

Even a saint experiences difficulty in Christian living. When Peter stopped eating with Gentile converts because he did not want to wound the sensibilities of Jewish Christians, Paul says, "...I opposed him to his face because he clearly was wrong.... They were not on the right road in line with the truth of the gospel..." (Galatians 2:11b, 14a).

At the end of John's Gospel, Jesus says to Peter, "Amen, amen, I say to you, when you were younger, you used to dress yourself and go where you wanted; but when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go" (John 21:18). What Jesus said indicated the sort of death by which Peter was to glorify God. On Vatican Hill, in Rome, during the reign of Nero, Peter did glorify his Lord with a martyr's death, probably in the company of many Christians.



1. Cycle of Catechesis. The most beloved of the Father.

Dear brothers and sisters

I wish to dedicate this and the next catechesis to children, and to reflect in particular on the scourge of child labour.

Nowadays we want to turn our gaze towards Mars or towards virtual worlds, but we struggle to look in the eyes of a child who has been left at the margins and who is exploited or abused. The century that generates artificial intelligence and plans multiplanetary existences has not yet reckoned with the scourge of humiliated, exploited, mortally wounded childhood. Let us think about this.

First of all, let us ask ourselves: what message does the Sacred Scripture give us about children? It is curious to note that the word that occurs most frequently in the Old Testament, after the divine name of Jahweh, is the word ben, that is, "son": almost five thousand times. "Certainly, sons (ben) are a gift from the Lord, the fruit of the womb, a reward" (Ps 127:3). Children are a gift from God. Unfortunately, this gift is not always treated with respect. The Bible itself leads us through the streets of history where songs of joy resound, but also the cries of victims are raised. For example, in the book of Lamentations we read: "The tongue of the infant cleaves to the roof of its mouth in thirst; children beg for bread, but no one gives them a piece" (4:4); and the prophet Nahum, recalling what had happened in the ancient cities of Thebes and Nineveh, writes: "Even her little ones were dashed to pieces at the corner of every street" (3:10). Think of how many children, today, are dying of hunger and destitution, or torn apart by bombs.

The storm of the violence of Herod, who slaughters the infants of Bethlehem, erupts immediately even on the newborn Jesus. A dismal tragedy that repeats in other forms throughout history. And here, for Jesus and His parents, is the nightmare of becoming refugees in a foreign country, as still happens today to many people, to many children (cf. Mt 2:13-18). Once the storm has passed, Jesus grows up in a village never named in the Old Testament, Nazareth; He learns the carpenter's trade from His legal father, Joseph (cf. Mk 6:3; Mt 13:55). In this way, "the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon Him" (Lk 2:40).

In His public life, Jesus went preaching from village to village together with His disciples. One day, some mothers approached Him and presented Him their children to bless; but the disciples rebuked Him. So Jesus, breaking with the tradition

according to which children were considered simply as passive objects, calls the disciples to Him and says: "Let the children come to me and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these". And He thus indicates the little ones as a model for adults. And He solemnly adds: "Amen, I say to you, whoever does not accept the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it" (Lk 18:16-17).

In a similar passage, Jesus calls to a child, places him among the disciples, and says: "Unless you turn and become like children, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven" (Mt 18:3). And then He cautions: "Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone hung around his neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea" (Mt 18:6).

Brothers and sisters, the disciples of Jesus Christ must never allow children to be neglected or mistreated, to be deprived of their rights, not to be loved or protected. Christians have the duty to earnestly prevent and firmly condemn violence or abuse against children.

Today too, in particular, there are too many children forced to work. But a child who does not smile, a child who does not dream cannot know or nurture his or her talents. In every part of the globe there are children who are exploited by an economy that does not respect life; an economy that, in so doing, consumes our greatest store of hope and love. But children occupy a special place in God's heart, and whoever harms a child will have to account to Him.

Dear brothers and sisters, those who recognize themselves as children of God, and especially those who are sent to bring the glad tidings of the Gospel to others, cannot remain indifferent; they cannot accept that our little sisters and brothers, instead of being loved and protected, are robbed of their childhood, of their dreams, victims of exploitation and marginalization.

Let us ask the Lord to open our minds and hearts to care and tenderness, and for every boy and every girl to be able to grow in age, wisdom and grace (cf. Lk 2:52), receiving and giving love. Thank you.

Summary of the Holy Father's words:

Dear brothers and sisters: In this final catechesis of the Christmas season, I would like to reflect in a special way on children, their dignity and their welfare.

Our world, which can peer into the depths of space, is often blind to the desperate needs of innocent children all around us who are suffering from abject poverty, exploitation and abuse. The Gospels reveal Jesus' particular love for children, whom he holds up as a model for all those who desire to enter into the kingdom of heaven. As his disciples, we are called to make every effort to ensure that children are not robbed of their childhood and their dreams, especially by the brutality of war and the scourge of child labour. As we begin this Jubilee Year in the sign of hope, let us pray that every child in our world may come to experience love, freedom, security and the promise of a dignified future.

2. To hope is to begin again – John the Baptist

Dear brothers and sisters,

Many of you are here in Rome as "pilgrims of hope". This morning, we are starting the Saturday Jubilee audiences, which will ideally welcome and embrace all those who are coming from all over the world in search of a new beginning. Indeed, the Jubilee is a new beginning, the possibility for everyone to start anew from God. With the Jubilee we start a new life, a new phase.

On these Saturdays I would like to highlight, from time to time, some aspects of hope. It is a theological virtue, the Catechism tells us. And in Latin, *virtus* means "strength"; thus, it is a strength that comes from God. Hope, therefore, is not a habit or a character trait – that you either have or you don't – but a *strength to be asked for.* That is why we make ourselves pilgrims: we come to ask for a gift, to *start again* on life's journey.

We are about to celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus, and this makes us think about that *great prophet of hope*, *John the Baptist*. Jesus said something wonderful about him: that he is the greatest among those born of women (cf. *Lk* 7:28). We understand then why so many people flocked to him, longing for a new beginning, longing to start over. And the Jubilee helps us in this. The Baptist appeared truly great, he appeared credible in his personality. Just as we today pass through the Holy Door, so John proposed to cross the river Jordan, entering the Promised Land as Joshua had done the first time. To begin again, to receive the land all over again, like the first time. Sisters and brothers, this is the word: *begin again*. Let us put this in our heads and let us all say together: "begin again". Let us say it together: begin again! [all repeat several times] There, don't forget this: begin again

Jesus, however, immediately after that great compliment, adds something that makes us think: "I tell you, among those born of women, no one is greater than John; yet the least in the kingdom of God is greater than he" (v. 28). Hope, brothers

and sisters, is everything in this qualitative step. It does not depend on us, but on the Kingdom of God. Here is the surprise: welcoming the Kingdom of God leads us to a new order of greatness. Our world, all of us, we need this! And us, what must we do? [Everyone: "Begin again!"]. Do not forget this.

When Jesus utters those words, the Baptist is in jail, full of questions. We too bring many questions on our pilgrimage, because there are many "Herods" who still oppose the Kingdom of God. Jesus, however, shows us the new path, the path of the Beatitudes, which are the surprising law of the Gospel. Let us ask ourselves, then: do I have within me a true desire to start again? Think about it, each one of you: inside myself, do I want to begin again? Do I want to learn from Jesus who is truly great? The least, in the Kingdom of God, is great Because we must ... [Everyone: "Begin again!"].

From John the Baptist, then, we learn to recreate ourselves. Hope for our common home – this Earth of ours, so abused and wounded – and the hope for all human beings resides in the difference of God. His greatness is different. And let us start again from this originality of God, which shone in Jesus and which now binds us to serve, to love fraternally, to acknowledge ourselves as small. And to see the least, to listen to them and to be their voice. Here is the new beginning, our Jubilee. And so we must... [Everyone: "Begin again!"]. Thank you.

I greet the English-speaking pilgrims and offer my cordial good wishes that the Jubilee will be for all of you a season of spiritual renewal and growth in the joy of the Gospel. Upon you and your families I gladly invoke God's blessings of wisdom, strength and peace.

Summary of the Holy Father's words:

Dear brothers and sisters: During this Jubilee Year, many of you have come to Rome as "pilgrims of hope", confident in the power of God's grace to offer us the possibility of a new beginning. Hope, as we know, is a virtue that enables us to trust in Christ's promises and ask for their fulfilment in our lives. This Sunday we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord by Saint John the Baptist. John's message in calling for conversion was one of hope in the advent of the Messiah, a hope fulfilled in the coming of Jesus and his invitation to welcome the Kingdom of God. Like the crowds that flocked to the waters of the Jordan, may all who pass through the Holy Door this year receive the grace of interior renewal, openness to the dawn of God's kingdom and its summons to conversion, fraternal love and concern for the least of our brothers and sisters.
